 Released on his third album, "The Times They are a-Changing", in 1964.


 Written in August 1963, after Dylan had gotten into an argument with a hotel clerk.

Change

- Storm = metaphor for revolution which brings change
- The ,small ones' (fish, seagulls, etc.) are happy about the change



Change:

 Change cannot be stopped (e.g. the broken chains, the confusing words which are not understood)


 Foes of change will fall (just like the Pharaoh and Goliath)




Israel:

Israel:
